Robbery Kiosk

Evidence and artifacts from other lawmen and criminals in famous and not-so-famous
robbery cases. For example some of the robbery cases the kiosk will focus on: Joaquin
Murrieta, 1850 (CA); The Wild Bunch (Butch Cassidy and the Hole in the Wall Gang train
robbers), 1900; Lufthansa Heist, 1978; North Hollywood Shootout, 1997. c. 1700–current

Murder Kiosk Evidence and artifacts from lawmen and criminals in famous and not-so-famous murders. For example some of the murders that this kiosk will focus on: pirate & killer William Fry Boston, 1726; Mike McGloin (Whyos street gang), New York 1881; Clarence Hiller murder, Chicago 1911; Emmett Till murder, Mississippi 1955; Timothy Spencer, Richmond 1987. c. 1700—current

White Collar Crime Kiosk Evidence and artifacts from famous and not-so-famous white collar crime cases. White Collar Crime includes: embezzlement, counterfeiting, identity theft, environmental law violations, government fraud, insider trading, tax evasion, and practically any financial exploitation often involving deception and/or the breach of public trust. For example some of the cases that the kiosk will focus on: Enron, Exxon-Valdez, Upton Sinclair's *The Jungle*, Jonathan Nelson CFO of Paterson UTI embezzlement, Napster intellectual property theft, William Brockway counterfeiter 1850-60s, Frank Abagnale *Catch me if you Can*, Charles Ponzi fraud, Eddie Antar 1980s fraud, Benevolence International Fund racketeering 2002. c. 1800 –current

Organized Crime Kiosk Evidence and artifacts from lawmen and criminals in famous and not-so-famous organized crime investigations. For example some the cases that the kiosk will focus on: John Morrissey New York, 1860; Chinatown Tongs San Francisco, 1920; Meyer Lansky and Benjamin Siegel Las Vegas, 1950; Miami Drug Wars/South Florida Task Force Miami, 1982; John Gotti New York, 1990. c. 1800—current

Indian (or Harley) motorcycle c. 1920s

Public Enemies Gangster's personal items: Dillinger, Bonnie & Clyde, etc. artifacts
G-men Uniforms & Equipment: personal and Law Enforcement issued 1925-1935

Riot Shield c. 1970
Uniform Female Officer c. 1970
Undercover equipment for female officers c. 1970
Recruitment materials for women & minorities c. 1970
Identification cards for minority officers c.1970
Counter Culture evidence, ie., Drug items, Black Panther etc. c. 1970

The World Beat Evidence from pre-9/11 terrorism investigations such as USS Cole, embassy bombings in Kenya and Tanzania, Oklahoma City Bombing, shoe bomber, Atlanta Olympic Bombing. Uniforms from agencies that were folded into Homeland security.
