Police Unity Tour

The Police Unity Tour was organized in 1997 by Officers Patrick Montuore and Harry Phillips of the Florham Park Police Department. Their goal was to bring public awareness of police officers who had died in the line of duty and to honor their sacrifices, as well as to raise funds for the National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial and Museum in Washington, DC. The Unity Tour started with 18 riders on a four day fund-raising bicycle ride from Florham Park, NJ to the National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial in Washington D.C. The Police Unity Tour celebrated 10 years in 2006, with over 1,000 riders making the trip, culminating in an arrival ceremony to kick-off National Police Week. The Police Unity Tour is the largest donor to date to support the National Law Enforcement Museum. They are sponsoring the Hall of Remembrance.

It is the largest single provider of radio equipment for public safety use and its systems provide the backbone for first responders nationwide. NATIONAL HONORARY CAMPAIGN COMMITTEE

Edwin Meese

General Meese is Chairman of the Center for Legal and Judicial Studies at The Heritage Foundation, and was a member of the non-partisan Iraq Study Group. He served as the 75th Attorney General of the United States, from February 1985 to August 1988. He was previously counselor to President Ronald Reagan from 1981 to 1985. As Chairman of the Domestic Policy Council and the National Drug Policy Board, and as a member of the National Security Council, he played a key role in the development and execution of domestic and foreign policy. During the 1970s, General Meese was Director of the Center for Criminal Justice Policy and Management and Professor of Law at the University of San Diego. He earlier served as Chief of Staff for then-Governor Reagan and was a local prosecutor in California.

Dick Thornburgh

General Thornburgh served as the 76th Attorney General of the United States, from 1988 to 1991. After leaving the Department of Justice, he served as Under-Secretary-General of the United Nations from 1992 to 1993, before returning to private law practice at Kirkpatrick & Lockhart. General Thornburgh was United States Attorney for Western Pennsylvania from 1969 to 1975, and from 1975 to 1977 served as Assistant Attorney General of the United States in charge of the Criminal Division of the Department of Justice during the administration of President Gerald Ford. General Thornburgh served two terms as Governor of Pennsylvania, first elected in 1978 and re-elected in 1982.

John D. Ashcroft

General Ashcroft served as the 79th Attorney General of the United States, serving during the first term of President George W. Bush from 2001 until 2005. He was previously the Governor of Missouri (1985–1993) and a United States Senator from Missouri (1995–2001). He is the author of *Never Again: Securing America and Restoring Justice*. In May 2005, he founded The Ashcroft Group, LLC.

Davis A. Buckley

Davis A. Buckley, FAIA, the principal design architect of the firm he established in 1979, was elected to the College of Fellows in the American Institute of Architects in 2005. Mr. Buckley holds degrees in architecture and environmental design from Yale University. Mr. Buckley is the recipient of over twenty-four awards for his work on Nationally significant projects including AIA awards, two Henry Hering Medals, and a Presidential Design Achievement Award among others. Davis Buckley is the designer of the National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial and National Law Enforcement Museum.

Christopher Chadbourne is President and Creative Director of Christopher Chadbourne & Associates, an internationally renowned exhibition design firm based in Boston, Massachusetts. Jean Hill

Jean Hill is the National President of Concerns of Police Survivors (COPS). She is the past president of the greater Houston COPS Chapter. Mrs. Hill's son Barry Hill, a Harris County (TX) Deputy Sheriff, gave his life in the line of duty in December 2000.

Craig Floyd

Craig Floyd is the founding Chairman and CEO of the National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial Fund (NLEOMF), a nonprofit organization established by an act of Congress in 1984 to honor the service and sacrifice of America's law enforcement officers. Under his leadership, the National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial was built and dedicated in 1991. In 2000, Congress passed legislation authorizing the NLEOMF to build the National Law Enforcement Museum. Mr. Floyd is a leading advocate for the law enforcement community. He is a published author and is a frequent guest on radio and television news programs. Prior to his work with the Memorial Fund, Mr. Floyd served for 10 years (1978-1988) as a senior legislative assistant for U.S. Representative Mario Biaggi of New York.
